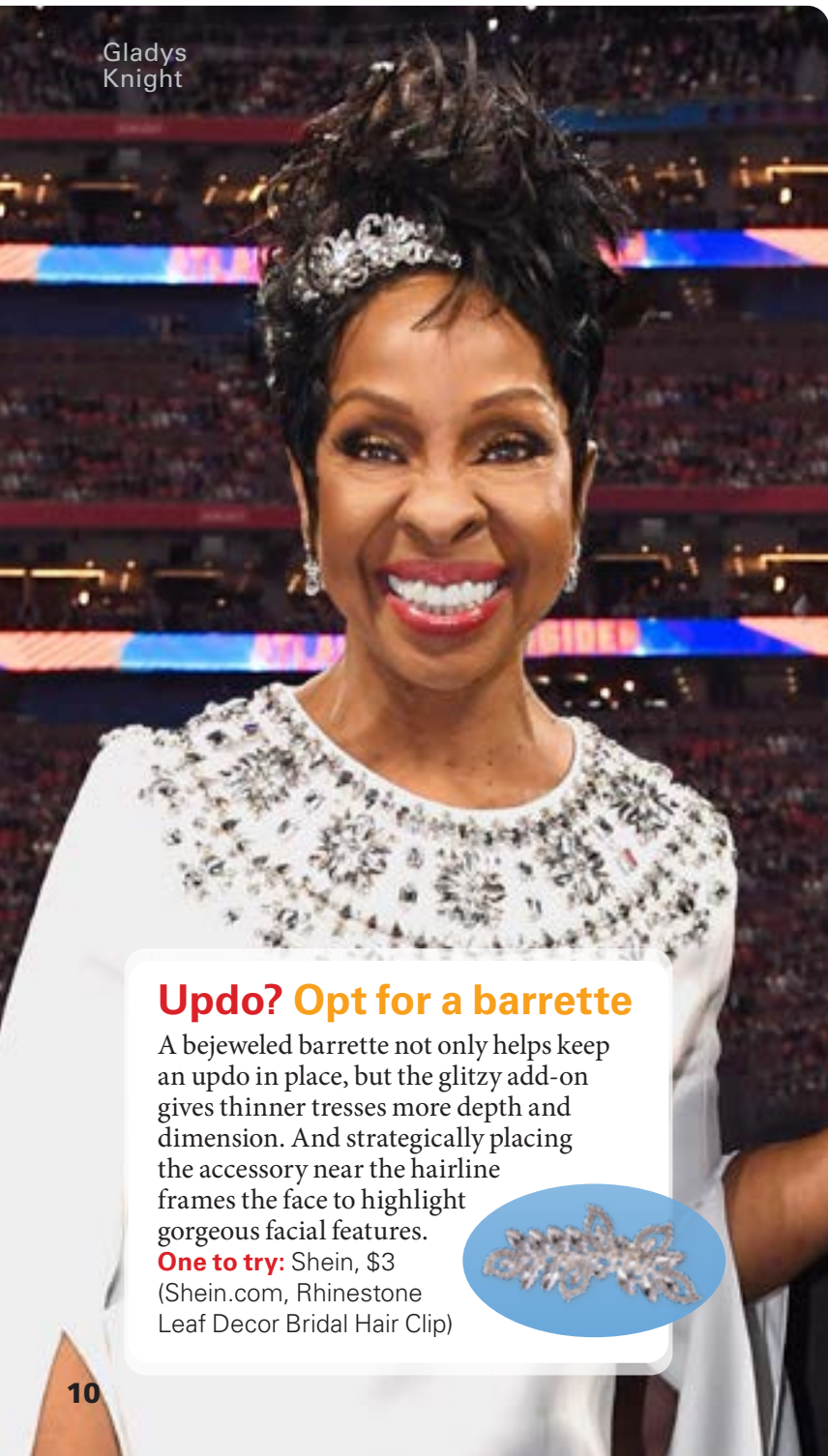

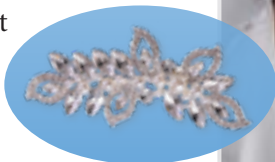

Updo? Opt for a barrette

One to try: Shein, \$3 (Shein.com, Rhinestone Leaf Decor Bridal Hair Clip)



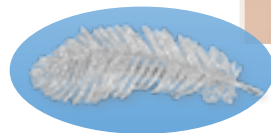

Short or medium-length hair? Choose a pin

Long hair? Pick a 'halo'

Slipping a sparkly, halo-like headband through longer locks holds down rogue flyaways while also drawing the eye vertically to optically elongate the face so it appears slimmer.
